Rector's Letter

Dear Church,

Welcome to Ordinary Time at St. Andrew's! Lest you think I am referring to something humdrum or a season that is unimportant, let me explain. Ordinary Time is the longest season in the Episcopal liturgical calendar and **provides a rich opportunity for spiritual growth, discipleship, and reflection on the life and teachings of Jesus.**

The word "ordinary" comes from the term *ordinal*, meaning "numbered." The Sundays of Ordinary Time are counted rather than named by a particular feast or season. On Sunday, June 7 we begin Ordinary Time in the liturgical calendar. The liturgical calendar is more than an alternative way of marking time. Every year, it retells the Christian salvation story, reminding us who we are and where we fit in the larger story of the world that God dreams. During Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost, the Church celebrates major events in the life of Christ and the work of God in the world. Ordinary Time invites us to live into the implications of those events. Rather than focusing on a single mystery of faith, **these weeks encourage us to follow Jesus in the daily realities of life.**

The liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, symbolizing growth, life, and hope. Just as plants grow steadily through the seasons, Christians are called to mature in faith through worship, prayer, study, and service. Green reminds us that spiritual growth often happens gradually, through ordinary acts of faithfulness rather than dramatic moments of transformation. The Scripture readings during Ordinary Time help shape this journey. Week by week, the Bible lessons follow Jesus through his ministry—teaching, healing, challenging assumptions, and calling people into deeper relationship with God. The readings invite worshippers to consider what it means to be disciples in their own communities and circumstances.

In many ways, Ordinary Time reflects the reality of most human lives. We do not live continually on mountaintops or in moments of celebration. Much of life consists of daily responsibilities, relationships, work, and service. The Church teaches that God is present in these ordinary moments. Following Christ is not reserved for holy days alone; it is a calling lived out every day.

At St. Andrew's, this summer offers numerous opportunities to grow in the likeness of Christ through learning, service, generosity, and community.

Beginning June 14 and continuing through August 16, adults are invited to participate in the **Summer Transformation Gathering (Adult Faith Formation)**, Sundays at 9:30(ish) a.m. in Conference Room C. The weekly lectionary readings will be the focus of the conversation, led by the Upper Room resource, Disciplines. Mutual transformation and listening to God will be the focus of this offering. Each session stands on its own, and all are welcome to attend as their schedules permit.

Growth in Christ also happens through acts of generosity and service. You may support the **Carillon Campaign**, helping to preserve this important ministry of music and public witness, or respond to requests from our community partners, **The Freedgedge, Neighborhood Alliance** and **Bellwether Farm**. You can also offer hospitality or assist with serving and cleanup during Community Meals, extending Christ's welcome to neighbors and friends.

The summer also provides opportunities to deepen relationships with one another. Families and individuals of all ages are also invited to participate in **Intergenerational Sunday Night Bible School: "We Connect,"** where faith formation, conversation, and community-building come together across generations. The Parish Retreat, also around the theme, **"We Connect,"** will gather parishioners for fellowship, reflection, and renewal as we explore our connections with God, one another, the land, the wider community, and ourselves at Bellwether Farm. Retreat dates are Aug. 14-15. (See info on page 11.)

We will continue our Justice and Peacemaking work as we host a screening of the **film *Dry Bones* (a Lyrical Film by Tara L. Conley) on June 16 and 17, telling the powerful Ike Maxwell story** of resilience, hope, and the movement of God in the midst of struggle. The film invites viewers into a deeply human journey that connects personal transformation with broader themes of faith and justice. This film will give an opportunity to reflect together on how new life can emerge from even the most difficult places.

Far from being a lesser season, Ordinary Time reminds us that the Christian life is a lifelong journey of growing into the likeness of Christ.

This summer, through worship, study, service, generosity, and fellowship, God can continue to form us day by day. This green season invites us to embrace the ordinary rhythms of life as holy ground where transformation takes root and flourishes. I hope you will put the opportunities listed above on your calendar and show up in the midst of Ordinary Time.

Message from Kathy Kerber, Sr. Warden

“Can you hear me now?” This was a popular ad campaign for a major wireless provider a few years back. This is not a mobile phone promotion, but I would like to make you aware of initiatives established by the leadership team at The Diocese of Ohio. The goal is to facilitate dialog among the faith communities. It is easy to slip into one way communication in the form of sharing of information. Two-way dialog with active listening is more demanding. Bishop Anne B. Jolly has challenged all in leadership positions within the diocese to improve communication to become more attentive to the faith communities we serve.

The Diocese of Ohio uses various forms of communication depending on the objective. If the purpose is to share information, the weekly email “What’s New in the Diocese of Ohio”, traditional letters and the website provide primary, verified sources of information. Workshops, and special events provide two way communication opportunities for parishioners to share concerns with The Diocese of Ohio leadership team. Focus visits are new and have been assigned to the diocesan leadership team. On May 24, 2026, Pentecost, Canon Christopher Whitaker, Interim Canon for Finance and Operations, visited St. Andrew’s. He joined us for worship and lunch. The objectives of his visit were to engage with the congregation, understand community needs, and listen to concerns and issues to share with Bishop Anne.

The Diocese of Ohio has also organized a monthly meeting of wardens with the purpose to provide wardens with opportunities to share challenges, successes and collective problem solving. The current focus is communication between Vestry and parishioners. The assessment of St. Andrew’s demonstrates a proficiency in fact sharing. Vestry minutes are posted on the website, and the “Message from the Senior Warden” appears in the Carillon. The weekly bulletin lists upcoming events. While not focused, opportunities for two way communication and active listening occur during Vestry member participation on commissions and task forces, and volunteering at outreach events.

In order to provide more focused attention to concerns and issues identified by parishioners, a notebook titled, “Questions for the Wardens” will be placed on the table near the window in the Gathering Space. Please write your questions, issues or concerns for the Wardens and/or Vestry. Follow up may be direct communication with the individual or in most cases appear in the Carillon or weekly bulletin. “Can you hear me now?” The Vestry is working to hear the needs and concerns of the good people of St. Andrew’s. We are listening to attend to the faith community we serve.

Summer Scripture Lessons - The Big Picture

"Having been called by Christ and empowered by the Spirit, disciples grow in faith, live in community, bear fruit in service, and live into the 'here and now and not yet' nature of the reign of God."

This is the undergirding message of the Scripture progression in Sunday worship this summer in Ordinary Time. In engaging the Scripture readings we are invited not simply to learn about Jesus, but to be formed and transformed into people who increasingly reflect Christ's life, love, and mission in the world.

For St. Andrew's, the Summer Scripture themes also resonate strongly with our summer and fall emphasis **"We Connect"**—connecting with God, one another in family and community, the land, and ourselves as we grow in the likeness of Christ through study, service, generosity, hospitality, and shared spiritual practices. While each Sunday has its own focus, several major themes emerge that will guide our preaching, teaching, and parish formation.

June 2026: Called and Sent

We see the Church moving from the great festivals of Easter and Pentecost into the work of discipleship. The Gospel readings focus on Jesus commissioning and preparing his followers for ministry. Themes include:

God's call and our response	Trusting God's promises
Courage in the face of opposition	The cost and joy of discipleship
Being sent into the world as witnesses	

Jesus gathers, equips, and sends the Twelve, reminding the Church that faith is never merely private but always mission oriented.

July 2026: The Kingdom of Heaven

July is focused upon Matthew 13 and Jesus' parables of the Kingdom. Themes include:

Seeds of faith and spiritual growth	Patience with imperfection
God's surprising and hidden work	The incomparable value of God's kingdom
Discernment and wisdom	

Familiar parables invite us to see God's reign at work in ways that are often unnoticed and gradual and we will be reminded of the "green season's" emphasis on growth and transformation.

August 2026 : Faith in Times of Struggle

As summer progresses, Matthew's Gospel turns toward stories of challenge, trust, and revelation. Themes include:

Wrestling with God	God's provision and abundance
Faith amid uncertainty	Jesus as the Bread of Life
Recognizing Christ's presence	Perseverance in prayer

The feeding of the five thousand, Jesus walking on the water, Peter's confession, and encounters with those seeking healing all invite believers to trust God even when circumstances seem overwhelming.

So this summer... let the Scripture studies of Ordinary Time, help you grow in "grace and truth", deepening your experience and equipping you for faithful living. Join St. Andrew's for worship and Faith Formation throughout the summer in person, on Zoom or via livestream. Looking forward to seeing you!

Standardized Church Office Hours Consistent office hours help parishioners know when office staff is available to answer questions, receive requests, and provide assistance. Establishing predictable hours makes it easier for everyone to access the support they need and strengthens the connection between parish leadership and the congregation. Leane Taylor and Cheri Van Wormer serve as Office Staff with the office open Tues. – Fri., 10 am – 2 pm.

The Return of the Weekly E-News Our weekly electronic newsletter is being renewed as a central source of information about worship, formation opportunities, service projects, upcoming events, and parish news. St. Andrew's E-News allows us to communicate timely information and helps members stay informed even when they are unable to attend church in person. Watch your inbox for the E-news, coming back soon.

A Rhythm of Ministry Recruitment, Resources and Reminders Recruitment: Regular, clear invitations through multiple channels (bulletin, e-news, announcements), Reminders: Timely, simple follow-ups that help ministry volunteers feel prepared and confident. Reminders are made via email, texts, phone calls and direct conversations. Resources: Easy access to schedules, role descriptions, and contact information so expectations are clear. We are working to provide these three elements, together to support ministry that is consistent, connected and life-giving.

Our Parish Website – www.standrewselyria.org Our parish website serves as a central hub for information about St. Andrew's. Whether you are looking for worship times, upcoming events, ministry opportunities, staff and clergy contact information, newsletters, or special announcements, the website provides a reliable place to find current information at any time. Vestry minutes and monthly financial reports are also available on the website. It is also often the first point of contact for visitors exploring our congregation. By keeping our website current and engaging, we strengthen communication within the parish while extending a welcoming invitation to the wider community.

Bulletin Announcements The Sunday bulletin remains one of our most important communication tools. Bulletin announcements help keep worshippers informed about opportunities for fellowship, learning, outreach, and service. We encourage ministry leaders and parish members to share announcements with the church office so important information can be included.

Social Media and Digital Outreach Many people today first learn about a church through social media. Regular posts allow us not only to communicate with current members but also to extend our welcome to the wider community. Social media can share stories of ministry, highlight upcoming events, celebrate parish life, and invite others to discover what God is doing through St. Andrew's. St. Andrew's 10:30 am worship service is livestreamed on YouTube and most Sunday's, we have an interactive worship service on Zoom. Links to both digital offerings are available on the website.

Communication as Ministry Communication is about much more than schedules and announcements. It is a ministry of connection. Every email, bulletin notice, phone call, social media post, and conversation helps weave together the relationships that make us a strong faith community. When we communicate well, we encourage one another, strengthen our common life, and create opportunities for people to grow in faith and service.

Are the Sunday Lessons and Gospel Readings Sounding Different to You?

It is not your imagination. Beginning on Pentecost Sunday (a great day to think about God revealing Godself in different languages, with different words) we began using the **Common English Bible** (CEB) translation for Scripture readings in worship.

We will continue this for a season and it represents a change from our current practice. It will give us an opportunity to hear familiar passages with fresh ears and renewed attention.

The Common English Bible is a clear, highly readable translation developed by a collaborative team of biblical scholars and mainline Protestant denominations.

Completed in 2011, the CEB was designed to make Scripture accessible and understandable to contemporary readers while maintaining strong academic and theological integrity.

This translation seeks to communicate the beauty and meaning of Scripture in language that is natural, engaging and easy to hear proclaimed aloud in worship.

The Episcopal Church officially authorized the Common English Bible for public reading and use in worship in 2015 through Resolution A063 of the 78th General Convention. Priests and lectors may use the CEB for public worship in accordance with the Church's approved lectionary cycles.

Throughout the history of the Church, Christians have encountered Scripture through many translations and languages. Hearing the Word of God in different ways can open our hearts to new insights, deepen understanding and help familiar passages speak to us anew.

We hope this seasonal use of the CEB will support both longtime members and newcomers in hearing Scripture with clarity, attentiveness and fresh imagination.

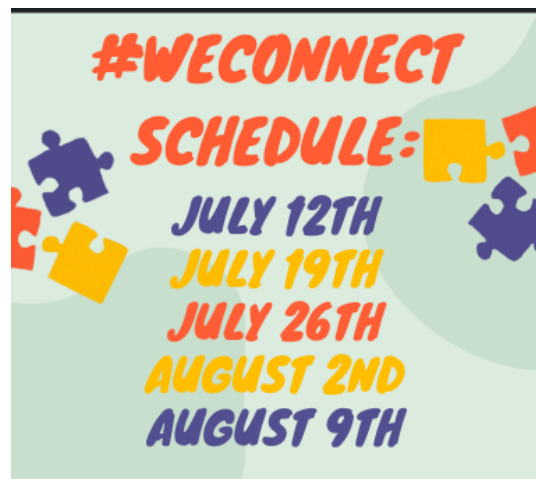
