# Rector's Reflections

Dear Church,

This letter comes to you as a window, offering glimpses from the 81<sup>st</sup> General Convention of the Episcopal Church where I served as co-leader of the Diocese of Ohio Intergenerational Pilgrimage and the fourth clergy alternate deputy. It was my first experience of General Convention, and these are just a few observations. More details, impressions and testimonies will come in the days ahead.

- 1. The Episcopal Church is both very large and very small. The vastness of the geography covered, worldwide, representing around 1.8 million members across 108 dioceses and three mission areas in 22 countries or territories is balanced by the sense of common identity as being Episcopalian. Everywhere we went we ran into people we knew or people who saw that we were from the Diocese of Ohio and knew people that we knew. It felt a bit like a very large family reunion with aunts, uncles, first, second and third cousins we had heard about but were meeting for the first time.
- 2. The Episcopal Church looks a lot like the world. Attendees reflected a wide range of ethnicity, first language, age, ability and gender meaning that most everyone there saw and heard from someone who looked like them, thought like them, and spoke like them. A question before the GC about appropriate dress for the occasion was answered by "whatever you decide you are comfortable wearing, there will be others who will be dressed like you." That observation was spot on with people wearing purple bishop shirts in the coffee line next to those in hiking gear with sandals, business suits, t-shirts and leggings, habits of religious orders, and "business casual" attire. Everyone could feel equally comfortable or uncomfortable depending on the scope of their comfort with diversity. The diversity of outward appearance was also mirrored by the diversity of perspective as was evidenced in legislative proceedings as well as hallway conversations.

# Rector's Reflections Continued

- 3. The Episcopal Church takes itself both seriously and lightly. The sixth months of preparation and study about the legislative process and content of the General Convention served only to offer a cursory understanding of the depth and breadth of its very, very detailed legislative work. Fortunately, there were many generous and experienced people who were willing to explain the multi-stage, multi-level proceedings. Formal decorum and process was the rule of the legislative sessions. (One day, early in the convention, there was a four-hour meeting about "how to meet.") This extreme seriousness was balanced by many opportunities for play and levity including party favors distributed for the extended evening sessions and a "Diocesan stanchion" decorating contest with the highly sought stanchion prize for the best decorated. Deputations brought diocesan specific "giveaways" and the Ohio buckeyes (candy) were a big hit. The playfulness and seriousness in the same space, often in a very short period of time, was refreshing and enlightening.
- 4. The Episcopal Church is grounded in the loving, liberating, life-giving love of Jesus. Every day began with beautiful, inclusive and dynamic worship. The music included familiar hymns from the 1982 hymnal as well as music of indigenous peoples, gospel and world music. All kinds of people shared worship leadership. Periods of prayer and listening for the voice of the Holy Spirit were woven around bold actions for racial justice, standing against gun violence and calling for advocacy for the marginalized. Even in times of great disagreement and difference of perspective, compassion and the respect for one another's dignity was evident.
- 5. The Episcopal Church is moving into the future, committed to adaptive change in order to be a sustainable church, living into and bearing witness to the transforming work of the Holy Spirit in in an everchanging world. Bishop Sean Rowe was elected to be the 28th Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. His proven track record of leading dioceses in adaptive change was named as one of his main qualifying characteristics. Throughout the convention, the steady message of the need for adaptive change in areas like finance, mission, worship and justice work to engage the needs of a changing world was profound. In words and actions, legislation and prayers, the Episcopal Church demonstrated that it is moving into the future and is intentionally adapting to do so.

## Report on St. Andrew's Investments for 2024

We are truly blessed with our investments, and I am pleased to report that they are doing quite well.

For the first six months, the Rauh fund at Key Bank, has generated \$6,914 of interest income at 4.65%. We receive the money quarterly and it is dedicated for the use of Formation, Music, Rector's Housing Allowance, and Building Maintenance.

The JIF Mutual Funds, are dedicated for capital projects, building maintenance, youth ministry, and a savings account. The income is reinvested, and the Fund has generated \$11,687 through May 31st at an average interest rate of 4.6%.

The Gail Wassermann Money Market Fund made \$21,641 at an average interest rate of 5%. The income was reinvested and allocated to the four accounts that make up the fund, Outreach Community, Outreach/In-reach, Capital Projects and the Reserve Fund.

Launched in 2003, the Heather Campbell Reich Community Meals Program at St. Andrew's has been an active food ministry for over 20 years and counting. It currently hosts several meals per month and serves over 80 people per meal. Last year, in 2023, our Community Meals program served a total of 4909 meals to those in our local community; the number this year looks to be even greater. And so, for the month of July, we are highlighting those who volunteer their time and talents as a part of the Community Meals program, providing hot meals for all those in need in our community.

The Heather Campbell Reich Community Meals program is led by Bill Hebble, who puts in an enormous amount of work to make sure the program continues to run successfully and without issue. Bill manages everything from ordering groceries from Second Harvest Food Bank, to maintaining communication with our Community Meal Partners, to prepping the food carts for those preparing the meals.

Each Community Meal served by St. Andrew's on the 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of every month is staffed by a pool of volunteers that have a true passion and calling for this ministry. They are the people on the front line who prep and serve meals to anyone and everyone that comes to our door in need. The Heather Campbell Reich Community Meals program now also includes a Hospitality Coffee Hour at each of the six meals hosted here every month. This is a time of fellowship for all community meal guests to come, enjoy a beverage, and talk with their neighbors before the meal is served. This Hospitality Hour was developed and launched by Myki Van Wormer and is staffed fully by St. Andrew's volunteers.
