

AUGUST 2025 ST. ANDREW'S STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE CONTINUED (2/4)

TO ENGAGE THOSE IN OUR COMMUNITY WHO ARE QUESTIONING THEIR FAITH AND/OR SEEKING SPIRITUAL WELL-BEING

- Provide a safe place for asking questions, expressing views and seeking answers.
 - Sunday Night Bible School offered a weekly adult Bible Study
 - Monthly breakfast with the 8:30am congregation offers space for this kind of discussion
 - A discussion at the Parish Retreat suggested additional ways we might do this by creating an overall culture of safety and belonging
 - The Justice and Peacemakers Task Group is engaging in these kinds of conversations as they plan advocacy and education actions.
- ♣ Offer opportunities to grow spiritually.
 - Sunday Morning Adult Faith Formation was offered in Advent and Lent and will be offered again in Advent of 2025.
 - Weekly invitation to all to help lead the Prayers of the People
 - Faith formation resources (podcasts, online prayer resources and webinars) are regularly listed in the bulletin and newsletter.
 - Mid-week in person Contemplative Prayer Service continued through June and July 2025. Will be offered again in Advent.
 - Welcome cards inviting the larger community to attend and also visit the meditation garden were distributed at Lemonade at the Parade.
 - Sunday Night Bible School Christian Formation for all ages was a part of Sunday Night Bible School (40 different individuals – children, youth and adults attended over the course of 5 Sunday nights, 9 leaders shared their gifts in teaching and leading, 10 leaders shared their gifts in hospitality and dinner provision)

THROUGH GOD'S LOVE, SUPPORT CHILDREN AND YOUTH IN OUR PARISH AND COMMUNITY

- ⊕ Continue to integrate our children and youth in all aspects of our parish life.
 - Youth and children planned and led a "youth-led" worship service for the 10:30am service in May 2025.
 - Children and youth held a "Lemonade at the Parade" event and put their faith into action in providing refreshing lemonade to the Juneteenth Parade goers. They extended the ministry to Coffee Hour the following Sunday.
 - The children were leaders in launching, promoting and carrying out the United Thank Offering Campaign for the whole parish in conjunction with Sunday Night Bible School
 - At the Parish Retreat the children engaged in learning about the Strategic Plan and then interpreted aspects of the plan in "Tik Tok" style skits, demonstrating their clear understanding of both the intent and practice of this plan.

AUGUST 2025 ST. ANDREW'S STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE CONTINUED (3/4)

- ⊕ Encourage and support our children and youth from our parish and in our community.
 - We are now community partners with the AGAPE Youth Choir and will be hosting their annual conference at St. Andrew's in 2026. This partnership was the subject of an interview with AGAPE Ministry leaders and Rev. June Hardy Dorsey on the Radio Show "Hometown Voices" hosted by Russ Van Wormer on August 12 on WOBL.
 - A contribution was made to support the Lorain County Urban League "Back to School Bash" for the purchase of school supplies.
- - This is functioning with Allison Harris serving as the new chair and meets regularly with Ben Holcomb. This group planned and led the recent Baby Shower for Ben and Emily Holcomb. The Youth Commission will also work with Rev. June and other volunteers in sustaining children and youth ministry while Ben Holcomb is on Parental Leave.

TO PARTICIPATE IN GOD'S WORK IN OUR COMMUNITY AND THE WORLD

- ⊕ Continue to support groups focusing on advocacy and a similar mission.
 - o Summaries of letters from Bishop Rowe and Bishop Jolly in August newsletter
 - o Began printing Episcopal Public Policy Network Prayers in the Weekly Bulletins
 - o Juneteenth Celebration and Lorain Co. Pride participation and leadership
 - Continue to strengthen our partnerships with Lorain County Urban League, P2R (A Place to Recover), Neighborhood Alliance and Lorain County Pet Pantry
- Continue to share our building and resources.
 - Continuing with the current groups of Scouts, Lorain County Pet Pantry and Job and Family Services. No new groups are being sought until after the kitchen renovation is complete.
 - We will host the Agape Youth Choir Conference in October. 2026.
- Prestart the United Thank Offering Campaign in 2025, continue for two years, then evaluate its efficacy for continuing.
 - UTO was launched in conjunction with Sunday Night Bible School learning about UTO funded projects involving water.
 - o The 2025 UTO Ingathering is August 31, 2025
- Begin The Bishop's Annual Appeal in 2025 for individuals by promoting through publicity. Make an annual parish gift from outreach funds to the Bishop's Annual Appeal.
 - o The Bishop's Annual Appeal will be integrated with Advent programming.

AUGUST 2025 ST. ANDREW'S STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE CONTINUED (4/4)

- ♣ Continue to pray for, dream with, and support Bellwether Farm.
 - Summer Camp Counselors and staff attended Pentecost Worship at St. Andrew's, and we prayed for them in special prayers and introduced them to the parish.
 - Bellwether Farm has been added to our weekly prayer list along with neighboring churches.
 - o Ben Holcomb served as Camp Chaplain for two weeks.
 - o The Third Annual Parish Retreat was held at Bellwether Farm.
- ⊕ Explore new ways to engage current and potential new members.
 - For new members this is a very 1 on 1 endeavor with the Rector inviting them to participate in ministries. We currently have one new member helping with Community Meals, two new members expressing interest in choir, one new member engaging with Morning Prayer occasionally.
- ⊕ Explore what resources are available at the Diocese of Ohio.
 - 15 people participated in the Winter Convocation.
 - We plan to have a team of parishioners participate in the College of Congregational Development in August 2026
 - Members of the Justice and Peacemakers are attending Diocesan offerings on topics of justice and peacemaking.
 - The Diocesan Missioner for Innovation has offered to meet with a group interested in ministering with the high schoolers who walk past the church every school day.
 - The Resource Management Commission utilizing Stewardship Materials from the Episcopal Network of Stewardship.
 - Webinars offered by the Diocese of Ohio are publicized through St. Andrew's publicity channels.
- $\ensuremath{\,\widehat{\,}}$ Continue to have a balanced budget in compliance with our financial policy.
 - This has been accomplished for the 2025 Budget year. Work on the 2026 Budget is being done and will be completed after the Fall Pledge Campaign.
- Provide ongoing education to the parish regarding stewardship, including capital, environmental, and financial resources.
 - Resource Management Commission has set dates for Fall Financial Stewardship Campaign.
 - Vestry approved new policy for money counters that includes pledge card counting and management.
- - For now, this is being accomplished through the next steps in the kitchen renovation and the completion of the Meditation Garden and Labyrinth.
- ⊕ Continue moving forward while honoring our history.
 - "Open House" type events where our church is open during downtown "tours" have honored St. Andrew's history while sharing about ongoing ministries. The stained-glass windows have been of great interest.

Justice and Peacemaker's Task Force: September Update

With the 2025 Ohio General Election coming up on November 4, the St. Andrew's Justice and Peace Makers Task Force wanted to provide some helpful reminders about voting.

- The deadline for voter registration in Ohio is October 6. Voter registration can be completed online (https://olvr.ohiosos.gov/), by mail, or in-person at the Lorain County Board of Elections (1985 N Ridge Rd East, Lorain, OH 44055). Multiple public institutions (including the BMV and public libraries) have voter registration forms. Registration forms sent by mail must be postmarked by October 6 or earlier.
- You can check your voter registration and polling location at the following website: https://tinyurl.com/3nzzab36
- To request a vote-by-mail ballot, you should complete the form found on this
 website: https://tinyurl.com/3pwky46v. The form needs to be mailed to the Lorain County Board
 of Elections and must be received by October 28. Vote-by-mail ballots must be received
 by November 4 or earlier.
- In-person early voting will be available from **October 7** through **November 2**. Early voting occurs at the Lorain County Board of Elections (1985 N Ridge Rd East, Lorain, OH 44055). The hours for early voting can be found at this website: https://tinyurl.com/4hywtw9z.
- The election is scheduled for **November 4**. Polls will be open from 6:30am-7:30pm.
- A list of candidates and issues on the general election ballot in your voting district can be found on the Lorain County Board of Elections website: https://tinyurl.com/yvsnuky8. Note that there is a Lorain County-wide issue regarding a sales tax increase that is on the general election ballot for this year.

While participation in non-presidential general election years is typically lower, it is still important to vote. Elected officials serving our local communities can have a significant influence on our day-to-day lives.

Message from Kathy Kerber, Sr. Warden

S'Mores, what is not to enjoy? Toasted marshmallows oozing with melted chocolate placed between two graham crackers are the quintessential campfire treat. During the opening session of the 2025 Parish Retreat, participants were asked what they hoped to experience at Bellwether Farm. My response of "S'mores" may have been received as superficial or silly, but my intent was not to trivialize the retreat. S'mores is my metaphor for all the goodness of the St. Andrew's Annual Retreat.

The components of S'mores represent the benefits of the retreat. Graham crackers provide the stability or base of the treat and symbolize the foundational supports of family, faith and fellowship present during the retreat. Just like marshmallows, the retreat did offer some sticky challenges and burning situations. Self-reflection can be uncomfortable, the temperatures were very warm, the games were competitive, and a pig did try to eat my shoe, but the presentations, food and fellowship were outstanding. Bellwether offered so much to enjoy. Finally, a S'more would not be a S'more without chocolate. The combination of warm marshmallow mixing with chocolate make the treat special just as the nature at Bellwether reminds us that life is a wonderful gift from God. Please plan on attending next year's retreat and enjoy great food, fellowship, and nature. All are God's gifts.
