Rector's Letter

Dear Church,

During September I have had the privilege, along with Ellen Otis, Kathy Kerber and Cameron Taylor, of leading the children and youth during **Sundays at St. Andrew's.**

Sundays at St. Andrew's is a vibrant and growing Children and Youth Faith Formation program, brought to fruition last year through the discernment and experimentation of Ben Holcomb, Director of Children & Youth Ministry and the Youth Commission. It meets at 4pm on the first and third Sunday afternoons of each month, September through May. Designed around and rooted in the Evening Prayer liturgy, these gatherings offer music, Scripture, prayers, lively conversations, games, service opportunities and developmentally accessible engagement about "being Christian in an Episcopal way."

In September and October, the small-group activities include Liturgical Arts, Bible Stories, Saints of the Church, and Community Outreach. These multi-disciplinary activities allow young people to grow in faith, creativity, and service while discovering how discipleship connects to everyday life.

Sundays at St. Andrew's reflects a key goal of St. Andrew's 2024 Strategic Plan: "Continue to integrate our children and youth in all aspects of our parish life." It embodies the unique charism of St. Andrew's—a wide welcome to children, youth, and their families, recognizing the full ministry of all the baptized—and nurtures the current and next generation in the life of the Church.

As part of our stewardship theme, "Tell Out My Soul the Greatness of the Lord," financial support for this program is more than a donation—it is an investment in the ministries that share God's unconditional love with and through children, youth, and families in our community.

Looking ahead, our October 5 "Sundays at St. Andrew's" gathering will celebrate St. Francis of Assisi (Feast Day, October 4) and include a service project for the Lorain County Pet Pantry, culminating in an invitation to participate in the Blessing of the Animals. We look forward to the joy, learning, and service this special day will bring!

I celebrate this ministry with gratitude—for the creativity, faith, and service of our young people, and for the adults who walk alongside them. It is a joy to be able to work more closely with these young Episcopalians, as together, we live into God's call to share love, faith, and welcome with all.

Service of Remembrance October 30, 2025, at 7pm

You are warmly invited to the Service of Remembrance—a quiet, contemplative gathering where we bring before God those whom we love but see no longer. Together, we will speak aloud the names of those who have died, honoring their lives and making space for our grief in their absence. In the soft glow of candlelight, accompanied by gentle instrumental music and the simple, prayerful chants of Taizé, we will remember with gratitude, entrust them once more to God's care, and claim the sure and certain hope we have in the Resurrection. You are encouraged to bring photos, mementos, or other tokens of significance to help create an altar of remembrance, a visible sign of love and memory that holds our beloved close. This service offers a sacred pause in which grace, grief, and hope meet-a holy time to let the names of our beloved be spoken, cherished, and lifted to God in prayer. We gather as a community of faith as we walk with one another in times of joy and of sorrow.

The Book of Remembrance will be at the back of the church beginning October 5. Please write the names of those you would like to have read aloud at the Service of Remembrance.

Message from Kathy Kerber, Sr. Warden

Some truths in life don't seem to make sense. Consider, for example, exercise. It is logical to think that exercise uses energy and therefore makes one feel tired. The reality is regular exercise enhances metabolic efficiency and increases physical endurance. Another paradox: more structure in one's life will increase a personal sense of freedom. A daily routine with allotted time for specific tasks and objectives improves one's control over personal time and productivity.

The belief that generosity can grow one's wealth is another example of an outcome that runs contrary to initial expectations. Stephen Post, bioethicist and co-author of the book "Why Good Things Happen to Good People: How to Live a Longer, Healthier, Happier Life by the Simple Act of Giving" wrote that people who give are more likely to be happier and healthier than those who don't. The practice of giving transforms not only the recipient's life, but also the giver's life.

The "Tell Out My Soul" Annual Stewardship Campaign for St. Andrew's has begun. As Senior Warden, I encourage all parishioners to consider pledging as this helps Vestry anticipate income for the year ahead. Pledge revenue is used to fund programs such as our Community Meals, Christian formation activities, expenses associated with worship as well as maintaining the building and grounds. I will be honest. Fundraising requests and pledge campaigns used to bother me. I felt guilty because no matter how much money I made, I never felt I made enough to give enough. Stephen Post's book changed my mindset. Giving is a practice of gratitude. I now give from a heart of gratitude rather than from a sense of guilt. Please consider sharing your works, wealth and wisdom with St. Andrew's. Your pledge enables the St. Andrew's community to offer care, compassion and kindness to others as we share God's unconditional love.

Some Notes on the 2026 Budget by the Treasurer Doug Skladan

This year we find it necessary to ask about an increase of 14% in your financial support of your church. Your Rector, Finance Team, Commissions, and Vestry are all working diligently to try and maintain a balanced budget.

Our operating expenses have significantly increased as many of you have also experienced in your daily living.

- † Building and Grounds contracts, Electrical, Gas-Heat, have all risen. We did receive a reduction on insurance cost by increasing our deductible to \$5,000.
- † Office and Admin cost is slightly lower.
- † Worship expense had a slight increase over the 2025 budget.
- † Clergy expense increased with a proposed 2.5% increase in the Rector's salary.
- † The Music Director, the Com/Outreach Assistant and the Sexton also have a proposed 2.5% wage increase.
- † Karen, our bookkeeper will stay on thru the end of year for training Beth Gray, our new bookkeeper.
- † Our payroll taxes will increase for the wage increases,

Amid confusion and the spread of misinformation, we pray for women and families, that they may be upheld by your truth, shielded from unnecessary fear and pain, and guided toward safe and reliable life-giving choices. Protect the vulnerable from unfounded claims that distort science, endanger health, and create harm. Fortify medical voices who agree in opinion, labor for the good of all, and offer healing. Through Jesus Christ, your Son, who is the truth and in whom your light shines. Amen.

For the Lives Affected by Political Decisions

Almighty God, who hears the cry of the poor, we see how public words become weapons, how plans to cut and cancel ripple into real lives. We remember those who never make the headlines—families dependent on public health, preventive care, and chronic-disease programs that face the threat of cuts; people struggling as health care coverage hangs in the debate; those struggling to feed their family and whose documented needs are among data that is being erased from public view. Forgive us when we lose sight of faces behind political debate. Grant us compassion and courage to speak for those without a voice. Shape leaders' hearts, that they do not wield power cheaply. Hold fast your people in uncertainty; and in your mercy, redeem what is being lost. We ask this through Jesus, who fed the hungry and gave rest to the weary, the living sign of your compassion. Amen.

For The People of the Democratic Republic of Congo Seeking Peace

God of the oppressed, who hear the cry of the afflicted, you stand opposed to war and all violent acts that wound the vulnerable and the land. We pray for the people of the Democratic Republic of Congo, who continue to suffer from militia violence and unending conflict. Though peace deals have been made, little has changed. O God, secure a lasting peace for the Democratic Republic of Congo and mercifully tend to all who are injured or grieving. We ask this through Jesus Christ your Son, who committed no violence but bore violence in his own body, and now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Happenings with the CDC – October Edition by Greg Hebble


We are seeking volunteers that would be available on Saturday, October 18 for the Fall Open House sponsored by the Elyria Community Partnership.
